## Small, Rural College: @2700 students 23-24

- Native American Serving, Non-Tribal Institution (NASNTI), serves the Wind River Indian Reservation, home to the Eastern Shoshone and Northern Arapaho tribes
- Over 80% of students at risk of not completing college (low income, first generation, need developmental courses)





## Large Service Area that includes both rural counties of Fremont and Hot Springs, as well as Teton county, one of most expensive areas in US

Large programs: Ag/Equine, Nursing, Health Sciences, 2 BAS degrees

#### **Types of Data Used in Report**

#### Internal

- Assessment
- Student Success in Courses
- Persistence
- Completion
- Transfer
- Labor Market Data

This data helps us identify our own trends, but we need external data to answer the question of how does this compare to how others are doing



#### **Types of Data Used in Report**

#### External

- NCCBP (national, rural, peer comparisons)
- Wyoming Community College Commission Reports (state comparisons)
- CCSSE surveys (Student reported data compared nationally, similar peer schools)
- ETS/Territorium (graduates skills compared nationally)
- University of Wyoming Transfer Report (main 4-year transfer school)

This data helps to validate internal assessments, as well as point out areas of pride and areas of improvement
